

## Titles and Terms of Address for Christian Leaders

These are formal titles, which would be used for formal written invitations and documents. Typically people in their own Church would address them in this manner if they are Orthodox. However if you know someone reasonably well you may address them differently. Address in some churches has become more relaxed but the protocol still exists.

<b>Anglican</b>	Archbishops	The Most Revd	Archbishop
	Bishops	The Right Revd or The Rt Revd	Bishop
	Archdeacon	The Venerable	Father or Archdeacon
	Priest	The Revd	Father or Mr or by their first name
	Canon	Canon would become a part of their title (e.g. The Right Revd Canon)	Canon
<b>Protestant</b>	Most Protestant denominations would use The Revd for all levels of office when in writing. Some would use Pastor for conversation and announcing. Many have become more relaxed about this in modern times.		
<b>Quakers</b>	Do not typically use any titles.

<b>Dr</b>	If a person has a doctorate that designation may be included in the title, e.g. The Revd Dr. This does not apply to the Orthodox denominations, Quakers or The Salvation Army.
